Present Perfect Simple is used for actions that started in the past and stopped recently or are still going on. The focus is on the result. Action that is still going on. Situation that is still the same as it was in the past. We want to emphasise that the situation has not changed.

We use the present perfect to describe the past when it affects the present, for example talking about past experiences for something that began in the past and is still true describing changes. Examples: I have been to that restaurant twice. Emily has worked in the city for many years. Your hair has grown since last year.

When we use the present perfect tense we cannot say when something happened. It is used to talk about non-specific time or a period of time. The past simple tense is used for finished actions in the past for habits in the past for past facts for periods of time in the past. We can use the past simple tense to talk about a specific time or a period of time. Example 1. Present perfect I have lived in Hong Kong for 17 years.
